





Annual CPI Weekend Workshop to be held at Lafayette Head House in Conejos June 4-5, 2021



CPI is pleased to co-host, in partnership with Adobe in Action and property owner and architect Ronald Rael, a **two-day Weekend Workshop for up to 15 people** at the Lafayette Head Home and Ute Indian Agency in Conejos, Colorado, on **June 4-5, 2021**. The workshop will feature hands-on experience and learning opportunities involved with the preparation of adobe plaster mixtures (earth, straw, and water) and its application to walls by hand and with trowels under the

supervision of Ron Rael and Joanna Keane Lopez. Additionally, some selective areas of work will involve removing non-historic modern windows and replacing adobes and rough openings/frames to match historic window dimensions. Food and water will be provided, but participants are expected to arrange their lodging and to dress accordingly for work in the field under both potentially warm and cool conditions. Covid-19 safety protocols will also be observed.

The Lafayette Head Home & Ute Indian Agency was built by an early settler, businessman, Indian Agent, and former Lt. Governor Lafayette Head in 1855. He was appointed Special Agent to the Ute and Jicarilla Apache tribes, working especially with the Tabeguache Ute tribe and Chief Ouray. Head used his home and compound in Conejos as the agency headquarters for nine years, and it was sometimes referred to as the Conejos Indian Agency. The Head Home itself is representative of Indo-Hispano, Native American, Territorial, and early Colorado architecture. The site contains only a small part of the Head Home and compound, but also includes an adjacent adobe building (thought to be servant's and slave quarters), the remains of one of the first grist mills in Colorado, and archaeological evidence reflective of various eras and cultures present at the site. The site was listed on Colorado's Most Endangered Places in February 2021, and a Preliminary Property Evaluation Form has been prepared to support possible listing on the State or National Register.

The property owner and long-term resident of the area Ron Rael is Professor of Architecture and Eva Li Memorial Chair in Architecture at the University of California-Berkeley and is leading the effort to preserve the building and disseminate the complicated historical legacy of the site as a cultural resource to the local and regional community. Rael is a descendent of the families who accompanied Lafayette Head to the San Luis Valley. He is an expert on adobe and plaster whose research interests connect indigenous and traditional material practices to contemporary technologies, including helping to pioneer 3-D printing processes involving traditional materials. Rael is the subject of an upcoming hour-long documentary produced by the Cooper Hewitt Smithsonian Design Museum, which includes a segment about the Head House.



2021 Santa Fe Trail Bicentennial Commemoration Youth Symposium - September 22, 2021

The Santa Fe Trail Association-Bents Fort Chapter would like to invite students grades 6-8 and their teacher to join us for a special Youth Symposium associated with the 2021 commemoration of the Bicentennial of the opening of the Santa Fe Trail – the United States' first international transportation and trade route. The one-day Symposium is closely aligned with the Colorado Social Studies standards.

The Symposium is limited to 35 students plus their teachers. A maximum of five students and one teacher may apply from any school. If all spots are not filled, opportunities will go to the next schools on the waiting list.

There is no cost for the Symposium, which is being funded by sponsors. Boxed lunches, water, and hand-outs will be provided. Schools located over 50 miles from Bent's Old Fort National Historical Landmark may apply for a stipend to assist with the cost of travel.

Historic Wagon Wheel Gap Fluorspar Mine and Mill Soon to be Stabilized



The Wagon Wheel Gap Fluorspar Mine and Mill is located outside of Creede, a historically significant mining and ranching area in Colorado. Formerly a Colorado Fuel & Iron (CF&I) complex, the Mine and Mill are inextricably linked to the 4UR Ranch and Resort, which is in close proximity and under the same ownership by the 4UR Ranch, Inc./Leavell family. With State Historical Fund (SHF) support, both the Mine and Mill and 4UR Resort and Ranch were nominated successfully in 2019 to the National Register of Historic Places. After listing, again through a partnership with CPI, grant funds were sought from the SHF, and \$200,000 was awarded in the spring of 2020 to stabilize the most critical and severely deteriorated features of the Mill.



As with many other projects around the state, the pandemic disrupted the original timeline to execute the project due to uncertain owner operational and financial circumstances. Thankfully, earlier this year, the 4UR Ranch, Inc. was fortunate to weather the worst of the pandemic's effects and signaled they were able to move forward finally. The project team, consisting of the SHF, 4UR Ranch, Inc./Leavell family, Form + Works Design Group, and Harrison Western has since begun planning and coordinating to stabilize the Mill quickly and safely. If all goes well, the physical work, which will certainly be delicate and technically challenging, may begin as early as May. The timing is suitable, as preservation efforts at the Mine and Mill have frequently been difficult due to the site's overall size and complexity. However, this forward momentum will now capitalize on the recent National Register listing, dedicated owner investment, structural urgency, and strong community support that will bring this unique mining and ranching landscape to the public fore. This project is just the beginning of the overall efforts to preserve the unique and important resources at the historic 4UR Mine and Mill and Ranch and Resort site.

**Colorado Fuel & Iron Company Administrative Complex
Receives National Historic Landmark (NHL) Designation**

The stately and beautiful Colorado Fuel and Iron Company Administrative Complex, which served as the operational headquarters for the first and only steel manufacturer west of the Mississippi River from its inception until 1942, has become Colorado's 26th National Historic Landmark. Former U.S. Secretary of the Interior David Bernhardt approved the designation for its role in developing the American West in steelmaking, coal and coke production, and industrial and labor relations in the early twentieth century. The NHL nomination was prepared by Thomas and Laurie Simmons of Front Range Research Associates of Denver. The CF&I Administrative Complex is located across the highway from the historic steel plant in South Pueblo. Both were part of the Colorado Fuel & Iron Plant-Museum listing on Colorado's Most Endangered Places in 1999. The museum building and adjacent archives at the Administrative Complex have undergone considerable rehabilitation work over recent years. It serves as the Steelworks Center of the West Museum and archives complex. Portions of the steel plant itself continue in operation as a steel mill by Evraz Pueblo. At the same time, critical historic sections of the site, including the iconic smokestacks, remain potentially threatened by proposed improvements to Interstate 25 as it runs through South Pueblo. Congratulations to the Steelworks Center for becoming Colorado's newest National Historic Landmark!
